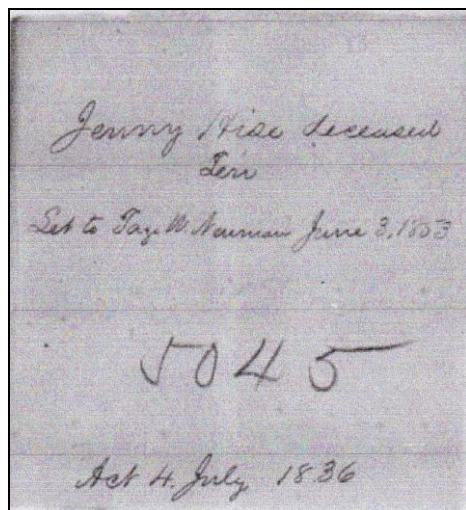


## JACOB HISE

Jacob was one of four brothers from North Carolina who saw service at the Battle of Kings Mountain. Only Jacob came to Greene County, Tennessee. On February 10, 1795 he is recorded in the Chancery Court record purchasing 200 acres of land deeded by Frederick 'Emmit', who had also served in the Revolutionary War. By 1809, Jacob Hise is shown in the 1809 Tax List owning 599 acres on Chuckey river.

Jacob returned to North Carolina sometime after 1812 [*First Settlers & Soldier*, by McAmis] He died in Haywood County, NC on January 11, 1821, long before the Pension Act was passed. Years later, Jacob's widow Jenny filed under the Act of 1836. Jenny died on August 26, 1846. After her death, Jacob and Jenny's son, Henry Hise, filed for Pension Arrearages due his Mother. This was denied by the Pension Office. Henry was living in Marion County, Tennessee, at that time.



As for Jacob Hise Senior's brothers, Conrad Hise died in Burke County, North Carolina on October 7, 1816. His widow, Sophia, filed for and received a Pension, number W4453. Their son, Conrad Junior, settled in Franklin County, TN where his Will was probated on April 20, 1859.

Brother, George filed for Pension, but his Pension was rejected for unknown reasons, Pension number R5044. He died on November 9, 1846 in Cabarrus County, North Carolina.

Brother Leonard Hise filed for Pension for extensive wounds received in the Battle of Kings Mountain: "I received two balls in my left arm and it was broken. I received a Bullet in right leg, and one bullet in my breast." Leonard spend 2 years in a hospital to recover from these wounds. He died February 20, 1845 in Haywood County, North Carolina.



I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Tennessee Marion County: SS

On this 12th day of January in the year of our Lord 1853 personally appeared before the Subscriber an acting Justice of the Peace in and for the County and State above written Henry Hise aged fifty-five years past and being duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration, that is he [is] the son of Jacob Hise who was a Soldier in the war of the Revolution that he served in the State of North Carolina and went from Washington County what is now Tennessee that he was at the Battle of Kings Mountain and affiant cannot specify the amount of Service performed by his father Jacob Hise above stated but thinks he served for a considerable time in the war of the Revolution, but for the facts of service he affiant must refer to the proofs accompanying this Declaration and to the proof otherwise furnished. Affiant would further declare that his father above stated died in the year 1820 on the 11th day of January leaving affiant's mother a widow, and her name was Jeney [could be Jessey] Hise, and that she never intermarried but continued the wife of Jacob Hise above stated up to the day of he [her] death which occurred on the 26th day of August 1846. Affiant would further declare that his father Jacob Hise above stated and his mother Jeney Hise above named were married in the year 1775, and that they were [word water damaged and illegible] on Watauga in East Tennessee or what is now Tennessee and was then in North Carolina, that they only proof of marriage is the births of the two children accompanying this declaration which affiant declares is in the handwriting of his father, Jacob Hise as above stated, Affiant would further declare that his father had three Brothers Conrad Hise, George Hise and Leonard Hise and that he has understood that they were all in the war of the Revolution. Affiant would further declare that his mother died leaving the following named children as her only heirs at law – Janus Hise, Sarah Alexander, Jincy Seaton [?, in another document, this name looks more like "Jincy Seayton"], Henry Hise (Affiant) and Lavias [?] Massy [in another document, this name looks more like "Lavira Murry or Lavira Mussy], he affiant makes this Declaration in order to procure the arrearages of pension due his mother at her death, under act of Congress of July 4th, 1836.

WILL OF JACOB HISE SENIOR:

On the presence of God Assure me.  
I, Jacob Hise Senior, being weak in body, but of sound  
mind and memory and taking into consideration on  
thought; that all men have once to die, I therefore  
think it right to make this my last Will and Testa-  
ment; And First of all I recommend my soul  
to God, who gave it; and second I request that my  
body be buried in a decent and Christian  
burial. And Thirdly, I desire for all my law-  
ful debts to be paid, And Fourthly, I constitute  
and appoint my beloved wife JANEY, my  
Heir and Executor of this my Last Will  
and Testament.  
I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife  
JANEY the one half of all my household furni-  
ture, also the one half of all my cattle, hogs &  
sheeps & the one fourth part of the increase of the  
wield and full possession of my dwelling  
house and garden, and also my negro  
man Dick during her natural life.  
In the next place I give and bequeath unto  
my son JAMES the plantation, whereon he now  
lives, except the part it before sold to said JAMES  
and that part I had sold to JOHN BURD &  
WILLIAM LIND SPIKE.  
On the next place I give and bequeath unto  
my son JACOB my plantation called the Corn  
place on the proviso the said JACOB pay unto  
JANEY widow or her legal heirs two hundred  
and twenty Dollars within two years from this

date to be discharged in trade and also give unto son Jacob my plantation on Powell's river containing one hundred acres, also one hundred Dollars in cash.

I also give and bequeath unto my daughter Sally all that plantation whereon she now lives and also one hundred and fifty dollars in money arising out of my estate, and also the land to remain to her children after her death.

I also give and bequeath unto my daughter Phillis four hundred and fifty dollars to be paid to her out of any money arising from my estate.

I also give and bequeath unto my daughter Gincy one hundred dollars besides the three hundred dollars, which my son Jacob pays to her as before mentioned.

I also give and bequeath unto my son Henry my land whereon I live with the Mill, and one soul mare, and the one half of all my cattle, hogs and sheep, all my books & medicine & all my tools of every kind & things belonging to the tolling mill, and also he is to have my boy Dick after the death of his mother, also he is to have two hundred dollars in money to repair said Mills, and the one half of all my household furniture.

I also give and bequeath unto my daughter Levina my plantation, grist and saw mills and all belonging thereunto on Crab Tree where son Ellis now lives.

It is also my will that all my children have an equal part in all gains of any kind James excepted & all the children mentioned in the above will is to pay equal if any loss shall happen, and also it is my wish & desire, that all my children named except James make an equal divide of all the balance if any shall remain in the hands of the executor after making settlements: And all the gains now on hands is to be for the use of the family of Jacob Henr, Levina de acknowledge, sign, sell and deliver, this as my last will and Testament.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my  
hand and affixed my seal, October the 31<sup>st</sup> day 1880.  
These words were hundred dollars in testimony before signed  
David Shook, Junr.      Jacob Wise, Senior Secy  
Joseph Reich's.

Then on page of the Minutes of the County Court of  
Clerk and quarter session of said County of Haywood  
at March Session 1881 is the following record, to wit:

The Last Will & Testament of Jacob Wise Sen-  
ior was exhibited & into open Court - by the Executors  
therein named (to wit) Henry Wise, and Jimmy Wise  
Executors, and the same was proved in open Court  
by David Shook one of the Subscribing witnesses  
thereto, and the said Henry Wise qualified  
as an Executor of said estate agreeable to the Will.

Jimmy Wise declined taking the oath of an Execu-  
tor, ordered by Court - that Letters testamentary  
issue to the said Henry Wise authorizing  
to execute said Will.

Then on the back of said Will is the following  
endorsement, to wit:

Henry Wise qualified.

I, J. K. Boone, Clerk of the Superior Court of Haywood  
County and State of North Carolina, do hereby certify that the  
foregoing is a true and perfect copy of Will of Jacob Wise,  
Senior, and of the records of probate thereof as appears  
from the original Will and records now on file in my office.  
This the 13<sup>th</sup> day of March 1889.
