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Anthony Duncan was in Greene County by 1795, when he and others were assigned to build a new road. The Court selected men from the area where the road was to be constructed. This area today would be near Doty's Chapel Methodist Church.

Testimony by Edwin Grubs and Azariah Doty. Greene TN minutes of Court of Common Pleas; Saturday after 2nd Monday Aug. 1795; ordered that a road be laid off from John Hughes to Joseph Parks and that John Hughes, Daniel Bowine, James Jones, John Jones, Jospeh Parks, John Newman Junr., Henry Stonecypher, Rudloph (sic) Boogh, Anthony Duncan, Thomas Ellis, Shad Morris, Philip Babb, Stephen Cotter, Joseph Hawkins, Henry Cross and Azariah Doty or any 12 of them being first duly sworn, view and mark the same and report next court. issd.

In the 1809 and 1810 Greene County Militia District of Captain John Olinger, Anthony Duncan owned 171 acres on Horse Fork of Lick Creek. This area was located in North Greene County. Azariah Doty is in this same District, owning 200 acres on Horse Fork.

Today, this area is where Doty's Chapel Methodist Church and Cemetery are located. Azariah Doty (1745-1851) was among the men who were assigned to construct this new road in 1795. He was also a Revolutionary War Soldier. He is buried on his land upon which Doty's Chapel Methodist Church and Cemetery were established.

In the 1830 Census, Anthony Dunkin, age 80-90 is living with a son. Nearby is Azariah Doty, age 80-90. These two old Soldiers must have had a great deal in common, and were surely some of the longest lived Revolutionary War Soldiers in Greene County.

When Anthony Duncan filed for Invalid Pension in 1832, his near neighbor and fellow Soldier, Azariah Doty provided an affidavit for him.

Anthony Duncan's Will was probated in the May 1839 Session Court. Anthony may also be buried in the Doty Chapel Cemetery.

The Will of Anthony Duncan appears at the conclusion of this article.

Pension Application of Anthony Dunkin (Duncan) S1808 VA

State of Tennessee }

Greene County } On this 25th day of October 1832, personally appeared before me Cornelius Smith an acting Justice of the Peace in and for the County and State aforesaid, Anthony Dunkin, aged eighty eight years, who having been first duly sworn according to Law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

Saith That he entered the Militia Service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated. Whilst he was a citizen of Augusta County Virginia he volunteered in the company commanded by Captain Cunningham, and served twelve months as a soldier at Fort Dinwiddie [possibly at present Stewartstown in Monongalia County WV] when he was discharged by Captain Cunningham. He does not, in consequence of his advanced age, and want of memory, recollect the year or month in which he entered the service, with sufficient accuracy to state it correctly. The discharge he received from Captain Cunningham is lost.

He again, was drafted and serv'd 3 months in the company commanded by Captain Trigg [probably Abram Trigg], and in the regiment commanded by Col [William] Preston. He marched, from Montgomery County Virginia, into the State of North Carolina, and participated in the engagement that took place, with the British, at Guilford Court House [15 Mar 1781]. During this tour he was also present at the skirmish which took place between the Americans and the Tories at Whitesels Mill at the Shallow Ford of the Yadkin River. [See endnote] He was acquainted with Majors [Joseph] Cloyd and Sawyers.

This Affiant was born in Lancaster County Pennsylvania In year 1743 or4, but has no record of his age. From Lancaster County Pennslylvania, he removed to Augusta County Virginia; from Augusta to Montgomery County Virginia, and from Montgomery County, after the Revolutionary War had terminated, he removed to Washington County Tennessee, and from Washington to Greene County Tennessee where he has resided for the last thirty years.

He has no documentary evidence by which to establish the veracity of his statements and knows of no person whose testimony he can procure, who can testify to his service.
