ISAIAH HURLEY Continental Line, Maryland

Isaiah was in Greene County by 1799 [McAmis *First Settlers and Soldiers*.] A man of this name, presumably Isaiah [Junior], was married in Greene County in 1801. In the Chancery Court Record of March 26, 1806, Isaiah purchased a negro named Changers, from Daniel Koffman. Isaiah [Senior] 1809 appears in the 1809 Tax List of Captain David White, when he was taxed on 300 acres of land, the location of which is not stated; however, the land was in western Greene County, near the Warrensburg area.

Family information states Isaiah was born in Prince George County, Virginia. His wife was Anny Hollaway who died on October 20, 1809. Isaiah died on March 31, 1811, many years prior to the passage of the Pension Act. His service is documented by the Military Headstone placed in the Hurley Family Cemetery in western Greene County.

Although Isaiah died intestate, a Land Indenture was recorded on January 23, 1818, which names his heirs: Joseph Hurley - Tillman Hurley - Daniel A. Hurley - Eliver Hurley - Ann Hurley - Daniel Coffman [presumably a son-in-law], one part and Zachariah Hurley, other part, all of Greene County, \$400 paid beginning on line of Joseph White; and, \$300 paid, 300 acres of land to which they are heirs from the Estate of Isaiah Hurley, deceased. Witnesses: Joseph Davis and John Kesterson.

Two of Isaiah's sons, Daniel Anthony Hurley and Tillman Elwin Hurley served in the War of 1812 in Captain Joseph Hale's and Captain Joseph Kirk's Companies. By 1812, Daniel owned 930 acres of land in Greene County, later living in Cocke County at the time of the Civil War. Daniel's son, James and a young grandson were murdered in their Cocke County home by Confederate raiders.

Son, Tillman, received Bounty Land Warrants for his War of 1812 service. By 1850, Tillman had left Tennessee and lived in Sangamon County, Illinois, where he died.
