




Martin received 100 acres in Bounty Land Grants in Northampton County, presumable in Pennsylvania:

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Martin Lintz Senior is found in very few Greene County Records. He appears in the 1809 Militia District of Captain Wilson's Company owning 203 acres on Lick Creek. Martin signed his Will on January 12, 1823, naming wife, Elizabeth, sons George, Jonathan, Martin Junior, and Abraham. Five daughters named were Sally, Polly and Peggy with 2 other daughters whose names are uncertain. In his Will, he mentions land "southside of the Camp Creek Road". One of the witnesses to the Will was Emanuel Parman. This could indicate Martin lived not far from today's South Greene High School area. Martin's Will was probated in April. His place of burial is not known.

One of Martin Senior's son, Martin Lintz Junior (1794-1872), served in the War of 1812 in Captain Joseph Hale's Company. Martin Junior is buried in St. James Lutheran Church Cemetery.
