Act of 1843

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Tennessee, Washington County

On this 22nd day October 1833 personally appeared in Open Court before the Justices of the Court of Pleas &c for Washington County now sitting Andrew Hannah a resident of the County of Washington & State of Tennessee aged seventy three years who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th, 1832. That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated.

That he was born in the State of Pennsylvania Lancaster County in Paxton Township in the year 1760 on the 30th day of August as appears from a copy of his age taken from his Father's record.

That about the year 1772 he with his Father & family moved to Surry County State of North Carolina where he remained until the year 1780 about the month of July as well as he now recollects he volunteered & enrolled himself under Captain Mynor Smith of Surry County in said County to march against some Tories who it was said had embodied themselves up near the Mountains. That the company to which he belonged was placed under the command of Major Winston [Joseph Winston] who was also a Citizen of Surry County and was marched into Wilkes County where he with all those under the said Major Winston joined Colonel Cleveland's [Benjamin Cleveland's] Regiment and was marched on near to the Catawba River where he with his Regiment joined the troops under the command of Colonels Campbell [William Campbell], Sevier [John Sevier] & Shelby [Isaac Shelby] and was marched from thence to King's Mountain where they met Ferguson [Patrick Ferguson] who commanded the British & Tories in a battle fought at that place between the American Army under the command of Colonels Cleveland, Campbell, Sevier & Shelby and the said Ferguson who commanded as above stated in which the British & Tories were defeated, killed and taken prisoners. This declarant states that he was in said battle, that on the night previous to the battle he was placed on the advance guard in consequence of which he was with his Captain & Company thrown on the right wing which was commanded by Colonel Sevier. After which battle he states he was marched into Burke County on the Catawba River where the wounded were left under the care of Dr. Dobson with two men to each one of the wounded of Colonel Cleveland's Regiment where this declarant remained until the person on whom he was appointed to attend died when he went to his Captain Mynor Smith [Minor Smith] and attended on him until he recovered of his wound, he also having been wounded in said Battle and returned home to Surry County with him by way of Wilkes Courthouse. He states that he does not

distinctly recollect the term of his service but is clear in saying that he served three months as above stated in said campaign. He states that he did not receive any written discharge, neither any formal discharge but returned home with the permission of his said Captain Smith as above stated. That in the Spring of the year 1781 he with his Father's family moved to Washington County then State of North Carolina now Tennessee where he remained until the latter part of the summer or fall of 1781 when he substituted in said County in the place of James Rendle who was drafted for three months and enrolled under Captain William Tremble of Washington County and State aforesaid attached to Colonel Sevier's Regiment of the same County & State and marched to South Carolina, crossing the Yellow & Iron Mountains on, by way of Camden, the high hills of Santee to Santee River when he with Col Sevier's Regiment joined Genl Marion's Regiment, was occasionally employed in scouting of the Tories & British; on one occasion he was with a scouting party under the command of Genl Marion who was Col of the Cavalry, Col Sevier who was also of the Cavalry & Colonel Oree [Horry] who took an [indecipherable word, could be intended to be "Auxiliary"] near a Moncks Corner with about 90 prisoners, guarded said prisoners into camp in a swamp on Santee River from which place this declarant was marched with Captain Tremble's company on to Washington County now Tennessee where he was verbally discharged by his said Captain Tremble after having served not less than three months but thinks it probable it was about four months as others who have a knowledge of said tour think it was about a four months tour.


He states that at the time he was on the tour to King's Mountain he had a substitute in the service of the United States; [said substitute] served a three months tour in the place of this declarant and said substitute was in a battle on Santee River & was wounded in said battle as this declarant understood and believes.

This declarant states that he served in the war of the Revolution not less than six months in the foregoing tours aside from the tour performed by a substitute as above stated. He states that he received no written discharge for either of the above tours of duty but was verbally discharged by his said Captains Smith & Tremble, he states that Col Marion & Col Horry belonged to the Continental establishment as he understood. He also states that he has no documentary evidence of his service. He knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service. He further states that he now resides in Washington County Tennessee where he has resided for the space of upwards of 50 years past.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and he declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the Agency of any State.

Sworn to & subscribed the day & year aforesaid. He further states that there is no resident Minister of the Gospel residing in his Vicinity who can certify as to neighborhood repute of his being a soldier of the Revolution.

[fn p. 11: On March 30, 1844 in Washington County Tennessee, Jane Hannah, 75, filed for a widow's pension under the 1838 act stating that she is the widow of Andrew Hannah; a pensioner under the 1832 act at the rate of \$20 per annum; that she married him October 14, 1788; that her husband died April 1, 1843; and that she remains his widow.]

"[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$20 per annum commencing March 4th, 1831, for 6 months service as a private in the North Carolina militia.]"

Dear Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim W. 794, it appears that Andrew Hannah was born August 30, 1760, in Paxton Township, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania.

In 1772, he moved with his father and family to Surry County, North Carolina, the name of his father or any of his family are not given.

While residing in said Surry County, he enlisted in July, 1780 and served three months in Captain Mynor Smith's Company, under Major Winston and Colonel Cleveland with the North Carolina Troops and was in the battle of King's Mountain.

After this service, he moved with his father's family to Washington County, North Carolina (which was later Tennessee), and enlisted in the summer or fall of 1781, and served three months in Captain William Tremble's

Company, Colonel Sevier's North Carolina Regiment.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 22, 1833, at which time he was living in Washington County, Tennessee.

He died April 1, 1843.

The soldier married October 14, 1788, Jane, her maiden name is not given.

She was allowed pension on her application executed March 30, 1844, at which time she was living in Washington County, Tennessee, aged seventy-five years.

WILLIAM HANNAH

North Carolina Land Grant July 14, 1809 in the County of Greene, 99 acres McCartney Creek

The State of Tennessee, No 64.

To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Now We that in consideration of an Entry made in the office of the Surveyor of the sixth district of number 184, dated the 21st day of February 1808, founded on a warrant of number 2956, issued by the Board of Commissioners of East Tennessee to James Moore, for one hundred acres of land, dated the 14th day of July 1808, and assigned by James Moore to Thomas Stewart, and by said Stewart to William Hannah the Petitioner. Thus is granted by the said State of Tennessee unto the said William Hannah and his heirs, a certain tract or parcel of land containing one hundred acres, lying in the County of Greene, in the District of Washington on the waters of McCartney Creek. Beginning on a white oak on Hannah's line; thence east forty poles to two pine oaks, then south forty poles to a red oak and hickory, then west eighty poles to a black oak, then north eighty poles to a white oak, then west twenty poles to a hickory, then north one hundred and two poles with S. Johnson's line to a hickory Johnson's corner, then north fifty five west with Johnson's line, hence poles to a sycamore, then south forty poles west eighty poles north forty one poles to a stake, east eighty poles to a stake, North thirty eight poles to a stake, south fifty five feet, ninety poles to a stake, south thirty five poles to a stake, east fifty two poles to a gum Hannah's line; then a direct course to the beginning. Surveyed the 21st day of February 1809 with the hereditaments and appurtenances to have and to hold the said tract or parcel of land with its appurtenances to the said William Hannah and his heirs forever.

In witness whereof, Willie Blount, Governor of the State of Tennessee, has hereunto set his hand, and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed at Nashville, on the sixth day of October, in the year of our Lord, One thousand eight hundred and nine, and of American Independence the Thirty fourth.

First Settlers & Soldiers, by Edward C. McAmis

"Born 1770 Virginia, William at 12 or 13 years was a Soldier in the Rev. War his widow drew pension in Polk Co., TN. William married in the year 1794 to Jane McConnell."

[The complete article provides comprehensive descendant information on the Hannah Family.]

The Hannahs came from Virginia where John and Margaret Hannah sold their son John Hannah land on the forks of the James River in Virginia in 1763.

It is believed that the younger John and his wife Audrey moved to Greene County, Tennessee where on 17 November 1791 John's son William received a land grant on McCarthey's Creek.

*John and Audrey Hannah moved to Blount County, Tennessee where John's son John Jr. also received a 640 acre land grant where the town of Maryville now is. John's wife Audrey died before 15 Feb. 1796 in Blount County and is believed to be buried in the old Presbyterian Church Cemetery in Maryville. On 15 Feb. 1796 John Sr. married Jane Trimble in Blount County, TN.

The children of John Sr. & Audrey were: 1. Andrew Hannah, 2. Betsy Hannah, married McKellep, 3. John, 4. *William M. Hannah married Jane McConnell, 5. Nancy Hannah married D.M. Ferguson, 6. Jane Hannah married Tedford, 7. Polly Hannah married Pride, 8. Isaac Hannah, 9. Matthew Hannah. John Sr. and second wife Jane had one son Moses Hannah. John Sr. named all of his children in his will Probated 27 Sept. 1813 in Blount County, TN. John Sr. and John Jr. are both buried in the old Presbyterian Church Cemetery in Maryville.

William Hannah son of John Sr. and Audrey was born 27 May 1770 Virginia? Died 5 Oct. 1810 Greene County, TN. Received a land Grant on McCarthey's Creek in Greene County, 17 Nov. 1791 his trade was thought to be a farmer. William served in the revolution at a young age of 12 or 13. His widow drew a pension in Polk County, TN.

William married on the 4 of April or either 27 May 1794 (Two different descendant's bibles give both dates) to Jane McConnell born 10, Nov. 1774 Lancaster County, Penn. Died 2 June 1859 Polk County, TN, daughter of Joseph and Susan Milligan McConnell. Joseph born 1745 died 24 May 1823 Blount County, TN. Susan born 1745 died 24 Aug. 1839 and said to be buried in Benton Cemetery Polk County, TN. with daughter Jane and Grandson Joseph Hannah.

Joseph McConnell left Pennsylvania in 1787 and moved to Blount County, TN and settled on Bakers Creek in the 6th District and raised his family there.

In about 1836 Williams widow Jane and two of her sons John Fruit, and Joseph moved to Polk County, TN.
